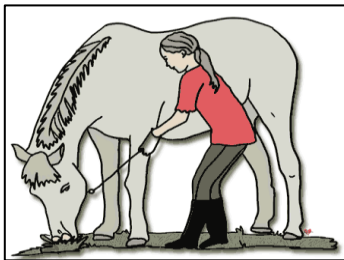

>>> BE PET PREPARED!! Essential Steps to Preparedness <<<

Evacuation

connect to official alerts to know when

- ◇ Know your route out, at least one.
- ◇ Know where you are going; friends, boarding, county evacuation locations.
- ◇ Practice loading your pets and have enough crates/cages or leashes and vehicle space to safely leave your home.



Buddy Systems are Best

- ◇ Exchange keys with someone you trust and can be comfortable evacuating your pets if your not home.
- ◇ Make sure your buddy has your pets information and your emergency contact information.

Have a Buddy, Be a Buddy

Pet ID

- ◇ Microchip is best, keep the information current!
- ◇ Collar with secure ID Tag or current phone number written with permanent marker on collar.
- ◇ Photos and selfies of you and your pets. Have copies stored safely; on your phone, in your disaster kit, in the cloud.

Pet Disaster “Go Bag”

What to have in your Go Bag at a minimum.

Food; 5 day supply & make sure to change out every couple of months if not canned.

Water; 5 day supply & make sure to change out every couple of months.

Medications; at least one –week supply of prescription medications and make sure not expired.

Identification; microchip information, photos, copies of vaccination records.

Pet Care Supplies; collars, leashes, harnesses, crates or carriers, water and food bowls, blankets, and toys.
